

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### Letter

### From ARCK's Founder and Executive Director



I wish you could meet Maia.

During an assembly in front of the entire school, students and teachers waited in silence as Maia took the stage.

She was not scheduled to perform.

Maia, a 5th grader at Gardner Pilot Academy who is on the autism spectrum, typically did not speak up in class or share her work with her peers.

This time, Maia spoke up. Maia volunteered to share her artwork during the "show and tell" assembly — a Persian mosaic tile she created with ARCK.

Just like Maia, I want all children to be able to speak their mind by giving them a powerful tool through art. At ARCK, we teach art for more than its own sake — we use art for social impact, empowering students to reach their greatest potential.

I founded ARCK after discovering that my son's Boston Public School did not have an art teacher, but my motivation went beyond my son's education. I wanted to help other students in Boston who did not have a creative outlet. As an immigrant from Jordan, I wanted to build bridges between children from different cultures and help English language learners develop the confidence to express themselves. I wanted students to make gains beyond artmaking skills and to have empathy.

ARCK has grown since our initial days, and I am overjoyed that we have brought arts integration programming to 1,300 students since we began. We are fortunate to have so many community members as volunteers. We need to engage Boston's students in learning creatively, so that they can become the leaders and changemakers of tomorrow's workforce. Join me, and our youth, in using art as a vehicle for social change to build a better world for all.

### Our Mission

Since 2012, ARCK has been using art as a vehicle for social impact in K-8 classrooms. We partner with Boston Public Schools to deliver arts integration programming that promotes 21st-century and social-emotional skills such as empathy, self-confidence, problem solving, and global awareness. In ARCK's core 36-week program, our trained teaching artists work closely with classroom teachers to offer weekly, in-school lessons free of charge through three modules: Leadership, Civic Engagement, and Social Justice.

Our mission is to empower students with high-quality arts education that fosters culture and community while supporting schools' learning objectives.

#### How is ARCK empowering students to reach their greatest potential?

- We engage students in learning their academics while promoting compassionate global citizenship and leadership.
- We expand and extend creativity through arts-based projects that focus on themes such as social entrepreneurship, sustainability, and human-centered design.
- We build bridges between students, classroom teachers, families, and communities because art takes a village.
- English language learners and students from low-income families gain a platform for their voices and creativity to be experienced by the wider Boston community.







### Our Vision

ARCK's vision is to fill the gap in creative learning not offered through traditional education, enabling students of all backgrounds and abilities to reach their full potential. A large body of research shows positive correlations between arts exposure and both academic achievement and development of social-emotional skills. In educating our future workforce, ARCK uses arts integration as a vehicle to engage students in learning, and to cultivate empathy and awareness of social issues. Our curriculum is designed with the personal integrity, cultural background, ethnic origin, and language orientation of the individual student in mind. In a safe and inclusive environment, we strike a balance between mutual respect and creative exploration, encouraging students to engage fully as single artists intent on their personal projects and as social creatures who can help one another with those projects. We encourage students to express themselves freely in response to thematic and formal prompts, but we do so knowing that the finished products will bear recognizable similarities that can bring the students together.







### **Program and Services**


ARCK's signature program focuses on intercultural exchanges and explores children's identity via art in K-8 classrooms. Through our carefully-designed 36-week curriculum, students break down barriers, understand and appreciate their own values, and gain global awareness. The curriculum consists of three 12-week modules that explore cultural identity (Leadership module), community participation (Civic Engagement module), and social and global awareness (Social Justice module), all built on a foundation of art-making. ARCK's highly-qualified, trained teaching artists collaborate closely with classroom teachers to customize grade level-appropriate lessons that tie in with academic objectives, including English Language Arts (ELA) and STEM. Beginning with the 2016–17 school year curriculum, centered around environmental issues, we focus on sustainability as a major theme of our curriculum throughout all three modules, as we aim to empower students to become the next generation of problem solvers in a future increasingly impacted by climate change. Through this program, we use art as a vehicle for social impact, helping students to reach their greatest potential.







### **Schools Served**







#### **Blackstone Innovation School** South End

ARCK has been partnering with the Blackstone, located in the South End of Boston, for four years and has served almost 400 students there. For the 2016-17 school year, we taught in two 1st, two 2nd, and two 3rd grade classrooms as well as a classroom for K-5 students with multiple disabilities. ARCK held its first annual Parent Art Night at Blackstone in 2016, in which families were invited to view their children's showcased work and celebrate their arts-integrated accomplishments.

#### **Gardner Pilot Academy** Allston

We have served this school since the inception of our organization in 2012. Last academic year, we served students in grades 2, 5, 6 and 7. In the spring of 2016, ARCK's 8th grade students at GPA had the opportunity to create a large-scale public mural with Boston artist Mark Cooper, entitled "I Am, We Are" on view across from Fenway Park.

## Stand Up for Art

Our annual public advocacy event, Stand Up For Art (formerly known as HeART for Art), was a huge success with around 500 attendees. ### **Annual Benefit Gala 2016**









October 27, 2016

Nearly 200 business and community leaders converged at the Sheraton Boston Hotel for ARCK's 5th Annual Auction Benefit Gala, "Think like Einstein, Paint like Pollock," to celebrate our arts integrated education accomplishments in the Boston Public Schools including the "I Am, We Are" public mural. We honored painter, educator, and Boston native Paul Goodnight with the 2016 Global Citizenship Award and experienced live painting by local artist Percy Fortini-Wright, who was assisted by two seventh grade students from ARCK's programs. Dining, dancing, and a lively auction completed the night.

Thanks to the generosity of our supporters, ARCK's annual fundraiser exceeded expectations set by the previous year's record-breaking event, bringing in nearly \$100,000 to benefit ARCK's programs. ### Addressing Environmental Issues










2016-2017 School Year

This past school year, our curriculum's overarching theme was Environmental Issues. Throughout our three modules of Leadership, Civic Engagement, and Social Justice, students in ARCK's programs learned about environmental challenges facing our local community and the world, and took steps to solve them through dynamic arts-based projects. During the Civic Engagement module, members from a Boston chapter of the advocacy organization Mothers Out Front visited our classrooms and spoke about the dangers of gas leaks including their contribution to climate change; afterward, students illustrated a collaborative map that showed the locations of gas leaks in their neighborhoods. They also designed posters to raise awareness about gas leaks. In our Social Justice module, students learned about the consequences of marine pollution. They constructed shoebox dioramas made of recycled materials to illustrate healthy ocean floors, and in another project they depicted aerial views of oil spills using pastel and tempera paint on paper.


### **Pilot Financial** Literacy Through Art

Following a successful Literacy Through Art workshop last year, this May ARCK piloted its first Financial Literacy Through Art workshop for parents of our students at Gardner Pilot Academy (GPA) who are English language learners. Participants each learned how to write checks and designed the cover of a mock checkbook using a variety of art materials. This component of our programming aims to engage parents in their children's school lives, and to extend the social-emotional benefits of ARCK's arts integration programming into their lives as well as their kids'. Generously partnering with ARCK were Commerce Bank and the Adult Education Program at GPA, which offers evening English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) classes free of charge to participants.

## **Budding Roots Exhibition**






**May - June 2017**








#### **Jamaal Eversley, Art Education Advisor**



Sara is an entrepreneur, natural leader, artist, educator, passionate activist, parent, and committed community member. She holds a B.A. in Psychology with a minor in French, and recently completed the Nonprofit Management and Leadership program at Boston University. She is fluent in Arabic, French, and Spanish. Her entrepreneurial experience began with a consulting business, localizing software into multiple languages. She moved on to specialize in Arabic software localization, working with Fortune 500 corporations. She is a member of the Beacon Hill Circle for Charity that supports children and women in Boston and been a board member of the Center for Arabic Culture and a volunteer on the Social Responsibility Committee for Commerce Bank (formerly Mercantile Bank).

In 2004 she began her education activist work, volunteering with local community members in a drive to open a Boston Public School to bring diversity and inclusion to Beacon Hill and other downtown neighborhoods. Recent honors include selection as a 2016 EXTRAOrdinary Woman of Boston by the Mayor's Office of Women's Advancement and selection to the Power Launch social impact nonprofit accelerator program's inaugural Social Change Fellows cohort in spring 2016.
